Dear Trinity Members,

I've got water on my mind.

- After a day of storms that blew through our area.
- After celebrating the baptism of our precious daughter Sybil.
- As we prepare to spend a week on the water of Lake Superior in a Voyageur canoe at the end of June.
- As I sip water in my office.
- As we get ready for the Trinity Backyard Series on Wednesday evenings this summer and focus on the theme of water in the scriptures.

Water is part of God's good creation and an essential part of our day to day life. Something that is as basic as H₂O, three small molecules that come together, created something that is so crucial to the life of our world.

- We know when we have just enough. The grass grows and our bodies feel healthy.
- We know when we have too much. Our basements flood, as do our communities and fields.
- We know when we have too little. Our tongues are dry, our lawns turn yellow, and the fires come.

One of the scripture verses I think of first when I think of water is Isaiah 43:1-3

But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.

When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you.

For I am the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior.

This passage recalls in my mind the promise of baptism. No matter how high the waters get or how dried out we are, God's promise to us is that we are called by name by the Holy One. But I also hear and appreciate the community aspect of baptism and heard it acutely during Sybil's baptism this past month. Our baptisms connect us with each other. Sometimes we need to be saved from the floodwaters, and sometimes we throw the life preserver out to those that need it. We come together in community to remember the waters of our baptism and to encourage each other to live out these promises each day.

May you be nourished through the waters of baptism this summer. May you be reminded of God's presence in the water we drink, the water in which we wash, and the water that falls from the sky. May you hear the promise wherever you are, that you are God's and called by name.

Wear Red Sunday, June 4 It's Pentecost!

"And you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you..." Acts 1:8

The seasons of the church year help us mark time in a different way than the regular 12 month calendar. The church seasons are seasons of faith, and each comes with it's own nuance/tone: for some weeks we are more penitent and inward focused (Lent), during others, we focus on celebration and new life (Christmas/Easter), at times we listen to the longings and hopes within us (Advent), and at still other times we look for the light and revelation of God among us (Epiphany). Each of these seasons comes not only with a faith and scripture focus but also a color representing it. You'll notice the colors in how we decorate the altar and worship space, as well as the stoles the pastors wear (at the 8:15 worship). Did you know there are only two red Sundays in the whole year? These are the Sundays where the Spirit is front and center, and one of them is coming up June 4: Pentecost.

You are invited on this "Birthday of the Church"—wherein we recall the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the first disciples in Jerusalem "like tongues of fire"—to wear red. As we look around the worship center and see all the shades of this color, may we be reminded that the Spirit moves among us now too.

On Sunday's this summer, you're invited to journey in faith with God's first chosen family. Who was Hagar, and what is her legacy? What did it feel like to be Isaac and nearly sacrificed? And Jacob, how could he act like he did towards his own brother? You'll find out that this ancient family is made up of people not too different from your own family members, but also—that God loves, claims, and gives us a mission regardless!






Summer Story Time for Young Children Make Friends with Books

A.M. service where they will be on hand to read story books. Children will receive prizes and have an opportunity to check out books.



HEALTH MINISTRIES



Summer is finely here! The wait has seemed long this year. But the crab apple trees in blossom, the leaves popping on the trees, and the green grass show us God's wonderful creation.

WebMD is one of my go-to resources online. It has some great suggestions for a healthy summer from health experts. 1) Give your diet a berry boost. A cup of strawberries, blueberries, or blackberries each day helps increase antioxidants which help prevent damage to tissues and reduce risks of age-related illnesses. 2) Get dirty and stress less. Plant a garden, flower box, or just a flower pot. Just putting your hands in soil is grounding. And being grounded can help relieve physical and mental stress. 3) Get outside. Whether it is a leisurely stroll, a bike ride, or playing tag with the kids; every minute of activity makes you healthier and reduces stress. 4) Wear sunglasses and use sun screen. Wear sunglasses that block at least 99% of ultraviolet A and B rays. Always apply sunscreen before going outside for any length of time. Reapply every 3 hours or more often if you get sweaty or swim. There is no such thing as waterproof sunscreen. 5) Stay hydrated. Drink those eight glasses of water daily or more if you are sweating. If you are thirsty, then you are already getting dehydrated. 6) Sleep well. Resist the urge to stay up later during long summer days. Pay attention to good sleep hygiene by keeping the same bedtime and wake-up schedule.
